Introduction to CWN

Child Welfare Nepal (CWN) is a child protection social organization established under the affiliation with the Social Welfare Act (1992) to support the children at risk belonging to vulnerable, marginalized, backward, lower class and poverty families.

Our major programs are ‘Urban Prevention Program’ and ‘Rural Prevention Program’ focusing in the education sector. Urban Prevention Program (UPP) is being operated in the heartthrob of the Kathmandu valley (Basantapur and nearby areas) while Rural Prevention Program is being operated in the neighborhood districts of the Kathmandu valley (Dhading, Nuwakot, Kavre, Sindhupalchok and Makawanpur).

CWN works in the education sector to solve the systematic education problems that persists in Nepal by enabling equitable access to quality education for all the scholars we are directly and indirectly involved with so that every scholar and children regardless of their socio-economic, gender, age, caste and other factors has access to quality to enhance their life by providing education, skills and other resourceful trainings to make them fully independent.

Since 2021, CWN have supported more than 400 scholars where more than 100 scholars have graduated +2 level.

Our main goal is to mitigate the drop-out rate from public, government and community school by providing all the resources (stationeries, uniform and other required schooling materials).

Areas of Impact

Urban Prevention Program (UPP)

Under-privileged, backward, lower classes, vulnerable and marginalized children are the common problem that has been occurring for a long time in Nepal. In the context of Nepal, the problem of under-privileged, backward, poverty and vulnerable children has emerged as a major social problem. The change in the political system also did not bring much difference in terms of addressing this serious problem as it was expected. Labor Act 1992 of Nepal defines children under the age of 16. But the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Child (UNCRC) 1989 defines every human below the age of 18 as child. The number of those children has grown in recent decades because of widespread recession, political turmoil, civil unrest, increasing family disintegration, natural disaster, and growing urbanization. Many visible and invisible factors are associated with the homelessness of children. Some of the main factors are: family breakdown, poverty, natural and manmade disasters, physical and sexual abuse, exploitation by adults, urbanization and overcrowding which in fact force them to spend their life on the street. In other words, an individual does not become a marginalized and vulnerable child on his own but social factors such as family background, economic factors, and political factors play a significant role to become a marginalized and vulnerable child (Swart, 1990). In Nepal due to high poverty level chances of being marginalized and vulnerable child is high. In many cases parental support to their children is not enough to fulfill their demand and thus it drives them to live independently. Due to lack of good governance and political system, responsible government authorities have not paid much attention to address this issue. Many children come from structurally disadvantaged homes where poor living conditions result in many difficulties. Parent's loss through death or abandonment and/or family conflict or shortage of housing may force children onto the streets. Children are an integral part of the society and they deserve the childhood, as it is their born human right. The UN (United Nations) convention on the rights of the child has ensured that every child in the world has the right to survival, development, protection and participation. However, an overwhelming majority of children in the world are deprived and denied of their fundamental rights. Nepal is one of the examples of a nation plagued by the problems of those children. Kathmandu, the capital city of Nepal, having more than two million populations according to data released by Central Bureau of Statistics (CBS) on 27th January, 2022 but however the data is not true. The assumed population in Kathmandu valley exceeds more than 6 million. The three districts of valley (Kathmandu, Lalitpur and Bhaktapur) is one of the major hubs of migration for people in Nepal. With growing rapid urbanization, Kathmandu is also the place of employment but due to high competition in the valley, people remain unemployed. Therefore, children's families who migrate to Kathmandu without qualification, knowledge and skill in hand will have to face a harsh life due to the competitive labor market. Thus, children's families have to do any work in valley to sustain their life. Kathmandu has become a major hub to enjoy their life. The valley life has attracted people from all 77 districts becoming a pull factor to leave their native place. With this, Basantapur, a major touristic hub has become one of the major migration destinations for people. People step into Basantapur as soon as they migrate to Kathmandu thinking that they will earn handsome money for their livelihood but the reality seems to be more far than that in real. Likewise, Prevention Program is one of the most effective programs in Kathmandu to mitigate the children's problems. Through prevention program,

many NGOs in Kathmandu and Nepal in big cities have played a crucial role to prevent children coming onto streets. NGOs who are running prevention program has been able to stop children forcing them to become marginalized and vulnerable children. Many NGOs in Kathmandu has started to operate urban prevention program providing schooling and hosteling support for children. With this, family income spent on children educational support will save making it easier to run their households. The program will ease burden to their children for educational support. Despite being so many communities and governments schools in Kathmandu, it is still difficult for parents to pay children's school fees as the education in Kathmandu valley is too expensive. The urban prevention program is one of the most effective programs to solve those problems. With this, CWN will also play a vital role to mitigate such problems of parents. CWN aims to support under privileged, backward, vulnerable, marginalized and lower caste community children to uplift their life. In addition, CWN aims to deliver quality education under urban prevention program for children for their betterment of life. Today, the mission of the "Child Welfare Nepal" is to continue to help the vulnerable children and give them a better future. For this, CWN relies on local actors and the funding donor agency. CWN constantly adapts to the situations and contexts of the country to keep effectiveness in its actions. CWN mainly finances to support prevention programs through the schooling of children in urban areas of (KTM) of the Bagmati region (region where more than 80% of marginalized and vulnerable children come to KTM and where the enrollment rate of girls is low).

Focus Areas under UPP:

- **Educational Scholarship:** An educational scholarship program that primarily assists scholars by covering their education expenses
- **School Materials Distribution:** Providing all the resources (uniform, shoes, bag and stationeries)
- **Family Visit and Economic Assessment:** Family visit and Economic Assessment of the family every year to know about their recent situation and condition of living
- **Psychosocial Wellbeing:** Ensure the psychosocial well-being of scholars through regular check-ins and counseling.
- **Career Support:** Support the career development of scholars by providing career counseling and opportunities for professional growth.
- **School-Parent-Teacher Support:** Work in collaboration with schools, parents, and teachers to ensure scholars have the support they need
- **Overall Well-Being:** Focuses on the overall wellbeing of the scholar through individual care and regular follow up

Activities of 2024

The detailed activities carried out in the 2023.24 are described hereunder.

1) Family Visit and Assessment Tasks

CWN's first priority is family visit and follow up their economic status. CWN directly observes their economic status by visiting their living room and fill up the assessment form accordingly. The children selected under CWN are really poor and have a low economic living where most of the parents are labor, porter and obviously low-class workers where they earn low wages. Their monthly income is not enough to support their children that's why they send their children into government school and community school. CWN have no such provision to keep any children in boarding or private school. It's us beyond the budget. CWN has to follow the new rule and regulation set up by the government agencies that organization should not recruit the children into private schools. This is because one children budget for private school is enough to support 5 children in government or community school. The assessments of 215 children are authentic because of the direct field visit and survey carried out by the Prevention Program Department's staff members (Amrit Karki and Sanjina Upadhyay Bhurtel). The tasked was completed in a span of two months (01 January to 29 Feb, 2024).

2) School Visit and Assessments

CWN staffs regularly visits school and colleges to know the situation of CWN supported children for follow up purpose. Not only that, we also visit principal and respective class teacher to know about children's daily activities (attendance, homework and other activities). Besides that, we also visit school to pay the fees. This work is mainly coordinated by Finance Head. Likewise, we also visit school to receive quarterly academic results of supported children. We coordinated with the school to hold a quarterly meeting with the respective teacher, children and their families to review about their schooling performance too. Similarly, before the selection of any children, CWN follow up governmental or community school and meet with the respective principal or class teacher to know about the needy students. Once the children lists are provided, CWN approaches with a methodology for further family visit and their assessments by directly observing their living condition.

3) Carrer Counseling to SEE students

On 23rd July, 2023 and 2nd July, 2024 CWN held a career counseling to SEE graduates of 2079/80. A total of 35 children graduated in 2079 and 2080 batch. The program was chaired by Mr. Ramhari Khadka and he stated about the challenges about choosing the right career prospectus. Youths should be guided proper so that he/she can choose the right course and subject about their own interest, told Khadka during the session. Parents should be more specific about their children choice and interest so that the children can pursue their dream accordingly. CWN staff also presented their own views about choosing their core subjects and their further plan after completing high school. Most of the students were interested in pursuing (Management and Commerce) subjects while the rest of few students were interested in studying Humanities faculty.

4) SEN-NHI Activity Project

SEN-NHI Team from Nantes, France who were medical volunteers arrived in Nepal on 13 June, for medical activity project. Their aim project was regarding Mensuration, WASH, First-Aid and Addiction course. Shanti Nikunja School, Bidyodaya Basic School, Rastriya Basic School, Neel Barahi School, Kumari Secondary School and Jubilant School of Kathmandu district and Shree Khadadevi School and Kuseshwor Higher Secondary School of Ramechhap district were selected for the activity project. CWN facilitated SEN-NHI students for their activities such as translation and management of the program. Mensuration was provided to girls of all school of grade 7/8 while WASH program was provided to young pupils for class 1 and 2 whereas First-Aid and Addiction program was provided to grade 9/10 students. The SEN-NHI group also went to Bethan, Ramechhap district for the same purpose. They handover mensuration pad for all girls who attended the class and towel/soap/toothpaste and toothbrush to all students who attended WASH program. In overall, around 300-400 pupils were benefitted from the activity project organized by SEN-NHI medical volunteers in different schools of Kathmandu and Ramechhap district. Similarly, the group also distributed grocery materials to 21 vulnerable, needy and poor families on 21st July, 2023. A sack of rice, one kilo cereals, 1 KG sugar and 1 packet of salt was provided to each family.

5) Partnership with NGO NSCPC

This year, CWN partnered with new NGO named 'National Street Children Protection Center'. NSCPC is a local partner of NPO OSIC (Organization for Self-Independence Children) based at Chiba, JAPAN. The collaboration between the CWN and NSCPC will work to support more vulnerable and needy children in future. Not only that, NSCPC also distributed groceries materials to CWN supported children on 14th October, 2023 and Desktop Computer on 10th November, 2023. The desktop computer will be utilized to teach children about computer application and MS Office such as Word and Excel. CWN conducts this activity every Friday for the students studying in grade 5 to 10.

6) AGM and Social Audit Program

Child Welfare Nepal (CWN) organized Social Audit and Annual General Meeting (AGM) on 22nd November, 2023. The Social Audit and AGM was held at Bougainvilla Events based at Tripureshor-11, Kathmandu. Around 30 people (Board of Directors, CWN staffs, School Principals, Ward Chairman, Social Welfare Council's General Secretary, Kathmandu Metropolitan City's Social Development Department Officer and Media persons, 3/3 children and families supported by CWN) attended the Annual Social Audit and General Meeting. The program was chaired by Board President Mr. Ramhari Khadka and Mr. Rajendra Manandhar (Chief Guest) of KTM Metropolitan Ward-20 Chairman. Other representatives from Social Welfare Council's General Secretary Respected Mr. Manoj Bhatta and Kathmandu Metropolitan City's Social Development Department Krishna Raj Tiwari also attended the function. A total of new 13 general members have been added in the executive lists.

7) Christmas Celebration

A total of 40 children attended the Christmas Program on 24th December, 2023. The program was celebrated at CWN office with the presence of children and staff. A 2.5 of pound cake was ordered for the program. Children enjoyed the celebration by singing the songs, designing of art and craft postcard and popping the ballons. The children were overjoyed the celebration by eating the delicious cake. A few gifts were exchanged between the children. A small program was held at Shanti Nikunja School with the presence of 50 children. Likewise, 100 sponsored children were engaged in letter writing to their individuals godparents as a part of cultural exchange. They also wrote a letter and prepared a postcard to their godparents.

8) Visit of Donor Agency to CWN

On 10th October, Mr. Kaisser Khatri Taveneau, President of donor agency (Association Pomme Cannelle-FRANCE) visited Nepal. During his visit, a high level of meeting was organized with CWN board members and staffs. Many important topics were discussed with the president such as addition of new children, operation of TUITION PROGRAM for critically weak students and project expansion. He said these topics will be reviewed with the APC-FRANCE's board of directors as the entire team decision will be able to consider about it. A small family and children meeting was organized at Shanti Nikunja School in presence of Taveneau on 13th October, 2023. A wide of range of major schooling issues were discussed in the meeting. Similarly, CWN team member also celebrated DASHAIN festival with Taveneau at CWN head office.

Kaisser Khatri Taveneau, President of the DONOR AGENCY (Association Pomme Cannelle-France) paid a courtesy visit to Nepal during the second week of February to hold annual meeting with the CWN board executive and team members. During the visit, CWN signed a new convention for the year 2024.25 and mutual contract with HLN-F. The convention and mutual contract will benefit the tripartite parties to operate the projects and programs funded by APC-France. The president of the APC-FRANCE, Kaisser Khatri Taveneau paid a courtesy visit to CWN for two times to inspect the ongoing project and programs funded by APC-FRANCE.

9) Formation of the Child Club (CC)

Children's clubs have emerged as an important new kind of institution in Nepal over the past decade. They appear to be both an expression of, and a promise, for the advancement of democracy and children's rights. This report summarizes the process used to evaluate the development and current state of functioning of about the child club that have been supported by Child Welfare Nepal. Their progress has been a remarkable natural experiment in the different ways that children can be involved in the management of their own organizations. According to the survey conducted by Central Bureau of Statistics (CBS) department under Ministry of Health and Population, around 28.1% of the total population belongs to children in Nepal. Child club is an important aspect of each organization who aims to protect the child rights and raise the voice against child trafficking, abuse and other forms of violence. Hence, CWN formed a child club on 2nd February, 2024 with the active participation of 25 children. The selected 25 children for the child club have its own President, Vice President, Secretary, Joint Secretary and Treasurer and active general members. The president, Vice President, Secretary/Joint Secretary and Treasurer were elected through a voting system. The goal of having a child club in NGO and INGO's has proven to raise awareness about children's rights and welfare,

enhance leadership skills and ensure children's participation in the NGO/INGO, Development Sector, School and Community through various activities.

10) Saraswati Puja Program

Saraswati is the Hindu goddess of knowledge. She is associated with wisdom, music, art, and learning. She is one of the three main goddesses of Hinduism, along with Lakshmi and Parvati. Together the three goddesses are called the Tridevi. Every year in Nepal, Saraswati Puja is celebrated on the day of BASANTA PANCHAMI. Basanta Panchami is a festival of Hindus that marks the beginning of preparations for the spring season. It is celebrated by people in various ways depending on the region. Basant Panchami also marks the start of preparation for Holi, which occurs forty days later. For many, Basanta Panchami is the festival dedicated to goddess Saraswati who is their goddess of knowledge, language, music, and all arts. She symbolizes creative energy and power in all its forms, including longing and love. The season and festival also celebrate the agricultural fields' ripening with yellow flowers of mustard crop, which Hindus associate with Saraswati's favorite color. People dress in yellow saris or shirts or accessories, share yellow-colored snacks and sweets. Some add saffron to their rice and then eat yellow cooked rice as a part of an elaborate feast. The SARASWATI PUJA PROGRAM was held on 14th February, 2024 at Shanti Nikunja Secondary School (Bhagwatibari, Kathmandu). The child club took the initiative to celebrate the SARASWATI PUJA PROGRAM. The committee of 25 members of the child club were highly attentive to celebrate the program so they presented their notion to the CWN. Hence, with their idea approaching, the CWN staff members were very positive as this was the first program held by the child club. Accordingly, the children shared their opinion regarding the activities and they included DANCING, SINGING and ART/CRAFTS for the program. The event was organized by doing a puja (offering) to the goddess with the active participation of the child club and CWN staff members in the CWN head office. A total of 30 children attended the offering program. Some sweets and fruits were distributed among the children as a part of offering blessings known as 'PRASAD' in Nepali. This is the religious followed practice of Nepali culture that the offerings should be distributed to all the devotees. The program commenced from 10:30 AM and lasted till 11:30 AM in CWN office. After that, a 30 min break was provided to the children to have a dal bhat and boost their energy for the program. Meanwhile, as many as 150-200 children participated in the program. Numerous activities were held during the event such as DANCING, SINGING and Art/Craft. The children's parents were also involved in the event as they came to see their children performing dancing and singing.

11) Partnership with TGH

CWN partnered with Triple Gems Hostel (TGH) operated under Triple Gems Educational Foundation from this year to refer the deserving students who are extremely talented and intelligent. Likewise, TGH is a child center protection organization located at Dallu Aawas, Ward 15 of Kathmandu Metropolitan City. TGH is operated by French Organization named a Triple Gems Association under the presidency of Ms. Anne Du Merle. Since the partnership between the two organization, TGH has been recruiting more than 100 children for their protection by providing every needed amenity such as EDUCATION/LIFE SKILL DEVELOPMENT, ACCOMODATION, FOODING, CLOTHING and RECREATIONAL ACTIVITIES for the betterment of children to uplift their life. Moreover, this year TGH planned to recruit 6 children from CWN. Similarly, TGH had prepared a guideline to select the

children from grade 4 to 7. Hence, CWN has selected the most disciplined and deserving student according to TGH guidelines.

12) Partnership with HLN-F

Herve Life Nepal-Foundation (HLN-F) is a non-profit organization which is located at Maru-20, Kathmandu, Nepal, established with the aim to provide a TUITION class for the most needy and weak students residing in the Basantapur area. CWN had signed a mutual contract to coordinate with HLN-Foundation to provide the lists of children who are critically weak in their studies and HLN-F have committed to provide them a tuition class focusing on their homework help. The organization have its own library too in the center to provide broader knowledge to the children where they can visit the library to gain the knowledge beside their schooling syllabus.

13) Farewell to GRADE XII students

As on dated 28th March, 2024, Child Welfare Nepal (CWN) organized Meeting/Interaction and Adieu program to grade XII students from different colleges. The program was systematized as HLN-Foundation had requested CWN several times to meet the grade XII students for introductory session. Similarly, a total of 15 students were present in the program. Among them, 8 students from Jubilant College, 2 students from Jana Prabhat Higher Secondary School, 2 students from Central College of State, each student from Capitol Hill, Gyanodaya College, Neelbahari school and Khwopa College attended the program respectively. The meeting commenced with a formal introduction with each other by sharing each other's social demographic information. The main purpose of the meeting was to bid a farewell to these students and hand over them to HLN-Foundation for their further support.

The main agendas discussed on the meeting were:

- Introductory Session with HLN-Foundation Fraternity
- Supporting of further degree (University Degree)
- Trainings and Life Skills Development (Computer Classes, COOKING, Electrician, etc.)

14) Refreshment and Capacity Development

In the first week of April, CWN staff members departed to Upper Mustang as a part of refreshment and capacity building training. A package of 5 nights and 6 days was designed for the refreshment and capacity building training. Four staff (Raju Khadka, Amrit Karki, Sanjina Upadhyay and Sabina Khadka) participated in the refreshment and training.

15) Letter Writing

Letter Writing is one of the important elements of CWN who are in the lists of SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM (SP). As many as 100 children are in the SP, according to the data provided by APC-FRANCE. More than 100 children were involved in the letter writing to their godparents (sponsors) to exchange the Nepal/France culture. The children were engaged in the letter writing session of Dashain/Tihar and Christmas and Happy New Year, 024 festival. Not only that, godparents also sent the gifts (present) to their respective children. Meanwhile, Aliza Karki was gifted a laptop by her sponsor.

16) Annual School Material Distribution Program

CWN distributes educational material every year to the supported students in the second quarter of English calendar (April and May) after the schools are resumed during the new Nepali academic year. CWN distributed note books (copies), register notebook, pens, pencils, calculators etc. to almost 183 children for the new academic session, 2081. As they get it from the start of the academic year it becomes very advantageous and helpful to them for their schooling (classwork and homework) studies.

OBJECTIVES:

- Distribution of educational materials “To ensure that school children’s education is not hampered due to lack of educational materials”.

Resources distributed to 235 children:

- 1) Regular school uniform, track suit and sweater
- 2) Bag
- 3) Black Shoes
- 4) Copies- 24 pieces
- 5) Pencil/pen- 2/2 packets
- 6) Calculator for grade 9 students
- 7) Register copy of size 5 for grade 9 to 12

Each child who received the above materials has signed a receipt.

Likewise, CWN will not provide the academic books to the scholars due to the suspension of the budget from the donor agency. The decision came as the donor agency’s president stated that government will provide the books to all the students during his last visit to Nepal in February, 024.

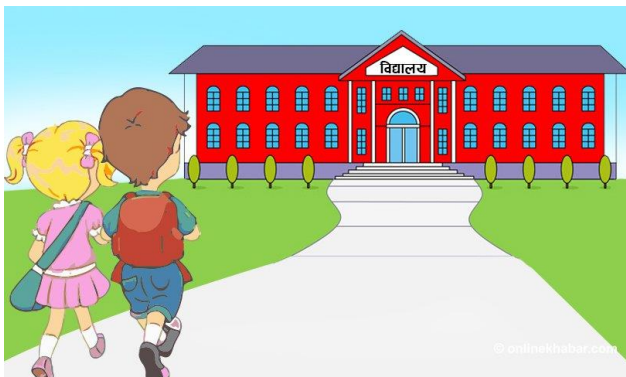

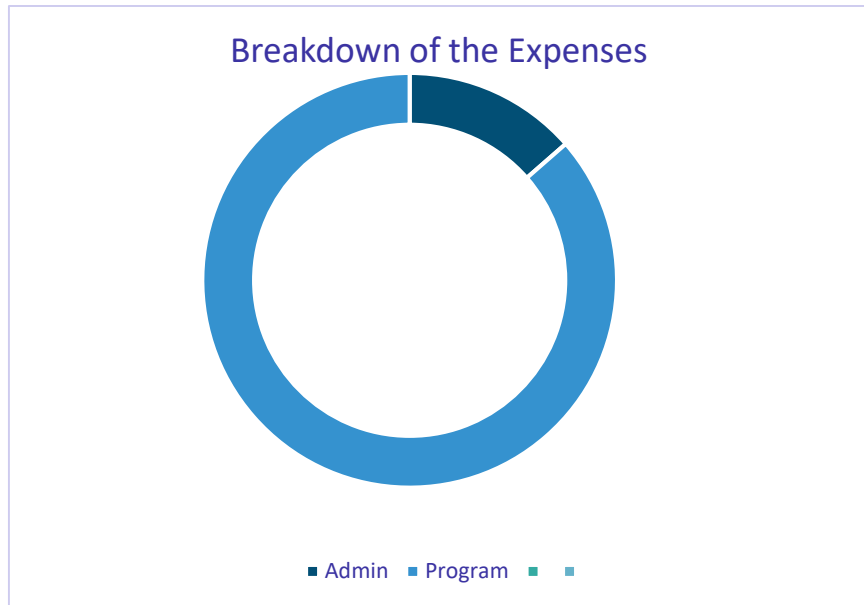

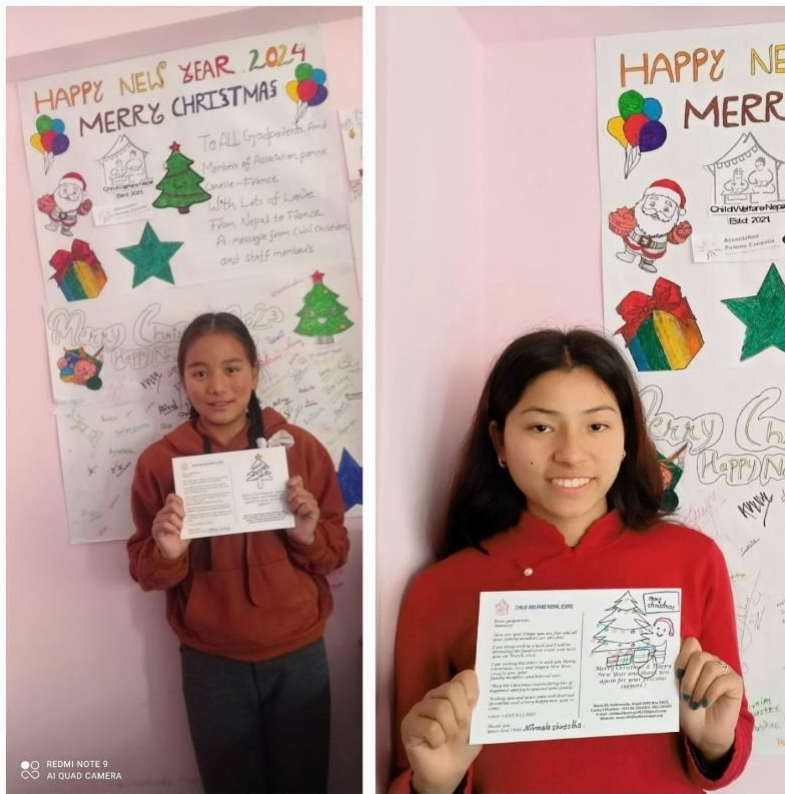

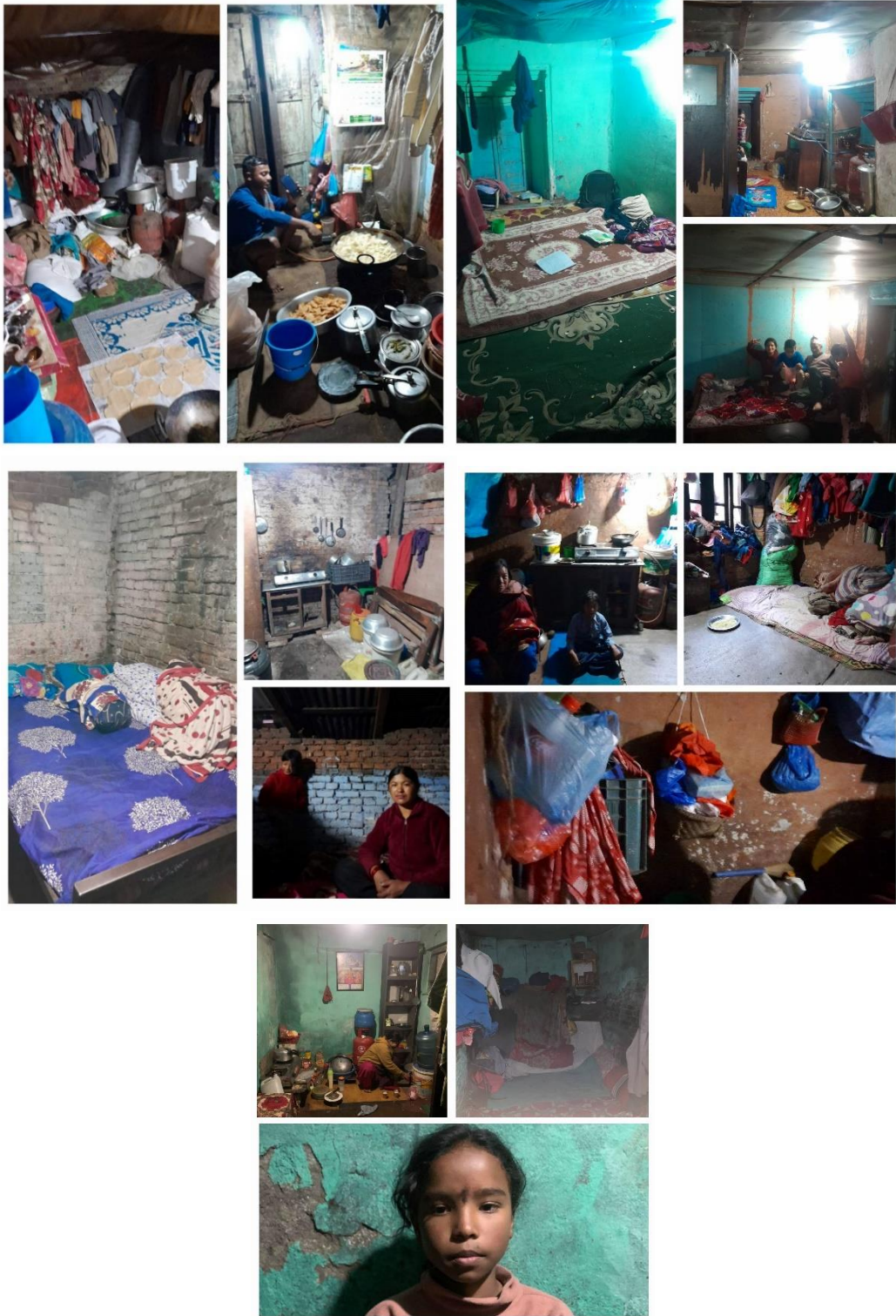
